Looking Ahead

The KDEM Preparedness Office continues our mission to facilitate and deliver quality training experiences to partners and stakeholders providing service to the public in an all-hazards environment.

We'll continue to provide Incident Command System trainings, including the G0191—Emergency Operations Center (EOC)/Incident Command System Interface, G0300—Intermediate Incident Command System Course for Expanding Incidents, and G0400—Advanced Incident Command System Course for Complex Incidents sessions.

The G2300—Intermediate Emergency Operations Center Functions Course will also be added to our schedule as a regular training; as a foundation for skillset trainings. The G2302—EOC Leaders Skillset Course is in the planning stages. The G2304—EOC Planning Skillset Course, and the G2308—EOC Operations & Situational Awareness Skillset Course are also going to be included in our 2026 course offering schedule.

The whole skillsets series include the G2302 — EOC Leaders, G2304—EOC Planning, G2306—EOC Resource, and G2308—EOC Operations & Situational Awareness. We hope to be able to offer all sessions in 2026-2027.

We also plan on several offerings of the L0146 Homeland Security Exercise & Evaluation Program (HSEEP) Training Course. The goal of this course is to provide professionals with a set of guiding principles for exercise programs, as well as a common approach to exercise program management, design and development, conduct, evaluation, and improvement planning. HSEEP is the basic course for the Kansas Exercise Design program and also a required course for the National Emergency Management Basic Academy ([NEMBA](#)) Series at the federal level.

The KS-132—Kansas Exercise Design Course for Discussion-Based Exercises and KS-133—Kansas Exercise Design Course for Operations-Based Exercises continue the Kansas Exercise Design series.

Besides these basics emergency management trainings, we also plan to continue to support the L0105 Public Information Basics courses (The L0105 is also part of the NEMBA series) and other more specific trainings bringing federal providers to Kansas.

In History

On January 6, 1996, snow begins falling in Washington, D.C., and up the Eastern seaboard, beginning a blizzard that kills 154 people and causes over \$1 billion in damages before it ends.

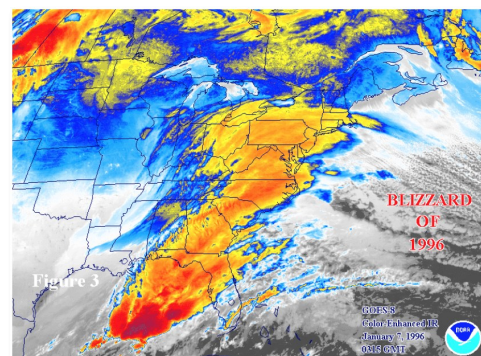
The Blizzard of 1996 began in typical fashion, as cold air from Canada pushed down and collided with relatively warm winds from the Gulf of Mexico. The clashing weather fronts caused a terrible combination of snow and wind. Snow began to fall in the District of Columbia about 9 p.m.; 12 inches fell over the course of the next 24 hours. In Lynchburg, Virginia, it was worse: A record 20 inches of snow fell in a single day. Since wind gusts were reaching up to 50 miles per hour, snow drifts piled up in many areas and travel was nearly impossible.

As the storm moved northeast, it continued to break records. Newark, New Jersey, received a total of 28 inches over several days.

Providence, Rhode Island, received 32 inches and Philadelphia was inundated with 30 inches. The Philadelphia schools were closed until January 16 due to the city's inability to clear the heavy snow promptly from the streets.

Overall, the blizzard took a serious toll on both people and property. A church roof in Harlem collapsed, injuring several people in New York City. Barns all over Pennsylvania collapsed under the weight of so much snow. As a precaution, many supermarkets, which often feature large flat roofs, closed across the region. Two buses collided in Pittsburgh and 52 were seriously injured. The storm deaths were mainly the result of traffic accidents, collapsed trees and homeless people dying from hypothermia. In a few instances, people who were trapped in their cars died from carbon monoxide poisoning. Pennsylvania suffered the most deaths, with approximately 80.

President Bill Clinton was forced to shut down



the federal government for nearly a week because of the storm. He declared D.C. and nine states to be disaster areas. Estimates of the total property damage suffered ranged from \$600 million to \$3 billion.—Article from [History.com](https://www.history.com).

Region 7's Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are co-hosting a 5-hour water and wastewater cybersecurity and protection webinar. Both the ability to supply water and manage wastewater are considered National Critical Functions. These functions are so vital to the U.S. that their disruption, corruption, or dysfunction would have a debilitating effect on national security, economic stability, and public health and safety. Presenters from Department of Homeland Security Intelligence and Analysis (DHS I&A), CISA and EPA will address water sector threats and associated risks experienced across the sector. Presenters will discuss methods for improving information sharing, preparing for, and responding to a cyber or physical incident, and "no-cost" federal resources and services for the water and wastewater sector. Those who attend the entire webinar are eligible for state Operator Certificate hours for states in region 7 (IA, KS, MO, NE).
